Peter graduated summa cum laude from Dartmouth College with a B.A. in English and received a M.A. in politics and economics from Oxford University, England. He began his career with six years at the White House, first as a chief speech writer for Vice President George Bush (1982-1983), then as special assistant and speech writer to President Ronald Reagan (1983-1988), with whom he worked on the historic “*Tear Down This Wall!*” Berlin Wall address. He also served as a close consultant when President Reagan visited the Triple Cities in 1984.

In 1990, Peter received a M.B.A. from Stanford University Graduate School of Business. In 1994, he published his first book, “*Snapshots From Hell, The Making of an MBA,*” which was praised by William F. Buckley, Jr., George Gilder and Laurence Tisch. He is the author of two other books, “*How Ronald Reagan Changed My Life*” and “*It’s My Party: A Republican’s Messy Love Affair with the GOP.*”

Currently, Peter is a research fellow at the Hoover Institution where he writes about business and politics, edits Hoover’s quarterly journal, the “*Hoover Digest*” and hosts the Hoover television program “*Uncommon Knowledge.*”
