A district-wide initiative to give our families the tools to keep their children safe while navigating the Internet is scheduled for Wednesday, March 6. Distinguished Internet safety keynote speaker Katie Greer will be speaking to students in grades 3 - 12 during the day on March 27 in four separate presentations at Vestal Middle and High Schools.

In the evening, she will offer a presentation for parents and guardians in the African Road Auditorium. A resident of the Southern Tier since 2012, Mr. Fowler is a native of Pennsylvania and received his undergraduate degree from St. Vincent College. He received his graduate degree from Binghamton University and has served as a Special Education instructor exclusively, with experience teaching 6:1:1, 12:1:1, and 15:1 classes.\* He has also enjoyed co-teaching, acting as a direct consultant to Special Education programs, and serving as a CSE chairperson.



"I decided to become an administrator to help make plans that benefit students' long-term success, and to support teachers in carrying out those plans," said Mr. Fowler. "I look forward to building positive relationships with Vestal families and teachers."

A **12:1:1** class includes 12 students, one teacher, and one aide; it provides services to students whose educational and developmental needs require additional adult support to access the curriculum. A **15:1** class includes 15 students and one teacher; students in this setting need additional academic support which cannot be met in a general education classroom.

Altogether, students donated 59 units of blood, which has the potential to save 177 lives!

Thanks to students in Mr. Klatt's Civil Engineering class last year, the Counseling & Guidance office has a fresh new look! To improve workflow and create a quiet place for students to relax, Mrs. Smith, Counseling & Guidance District Chair, asked for help from Mr. Klatt and his students. The students rose to the task, measuring the space, conducting surveys of students and staff, and creating and presenting their designs.
